From the President

There were three goals I shared in January 2021 after being elected JAGA president. We called them "The 3 Fs" – Fundraising, Forward Progress, and having Fun! In leading the organization, I'd like to think we paid attention to a lot of smaller, important considerations but also focused on several big picture items that made the organization stronger and more efficient by the end of the year.

Among the things addressed in 2021 were:

- With the support of treasurer Billy Walker of Cimarrone, we created our first annual operating budget and fine-tuned all of our budgeting and accounting procedures.
- We identified certain areas that previously had been overlooked but are now on top of through our "Areas of Focus" program, which spreads out responsibilities and activities among more JAGA directors. No longer are things falling through the cracks. Many thanks to those who are contributing to this effort.
- Some excellent additions to the JAGA director base are helping build and strengthen the JAGA bench, particularly among those who chair our tournaments. We are already seeing the results in better-run JAGA tournaments.
- Groundwork for the "Friends of JAGA" fundraising program was put in place

with a rollout expected in early '22. Success for this program is very important to JAGA as we look to grow and deepen our footprint and impact on golf in Northeast Florida.

- We've enhanced the working relationship between JAGA Operations and the JAGA Charitable Trust. With the leadership of Trust chair Wayne St. Clair of Jacksonville G&CC, things are very transparent, and our communication is greatly enhanced.
- George Halvorsen of Marsh Landing has made huge contributions in addressing some key items in our insurance coverages as well as some in our controlling documents for both JAGA Operations and the Trust.
- Joe Grippi of Deerwood is having great success with the effort to reel in the few non-JAGA member clubs in our area and recruit new directors at clubs where we have shortcomings or needs.
- Important relationships with key groups that are striving to serve younger people in our community who have less exposure and contact with our great sport are gaining momentum, namely

with The First Tee and Moore-Myers Children's Fund.

- While JAGA is an organization for everyone, we're working on broadening our involvement and interaction with women golfers in Jacksonville. We may look like an all-male group, but we aren't supposed to be.
- Our meetings have become more impactful with the addition of outside speakers and workshops covering things like rules, course ratings and tournament operations.
- We've improved JAGA's free monthly Northeast Florida Golf News, a widely respected publication that our golf constituents look to for news across all fronts of the local golf scene. If you don't receive it, go to jaxareagolf.org and sign up. It's free.
- And last but not least, JAGA will have a slightly different and fresh look in the year ahead as a modified logo and new tournament signage are unveiled by early January.

Fun was the third of the 3 Fs. Anyone who plays golf can't help but have fun being around the game we love so much. I hope that in JAGA's collective role as a leading promoter of golf in Jacksonville, we have made the game more rewarding and fun for you and everyone who comes in contact with us. We've enjoyed serving the golf community this past year and look forward to having more fun and making more progress in 2022!

Established in 1954, JAGA celebrates its 69th year in 2022. It is a not-for-profit corporation comprised of approximately 40-member golf clubs/courses located in Northeast Florida. JAGA's mission is to promote golf and goodwill through tournaments and related events and activities. It conducts 12 tournaments, including six championship events and six others that feature team formats. JAGA also manages a college scholarship program that can maintain financial aid for as many as 35 deserving students per year. Since 1974, the program has generated approximately \$1.8 million in financial aid to approximately 375 students. Each year between five and eight new scholarships are awarded.

Men's Amateur: played at Marsh Landing

Mike Smith of Ponte Vedra Beach got the monkey off his back and won his first Jacksonville Amateur Championship in his 11th try. Smith's 209 was one better than Japan's Kotaro Murata, whose secondand third-round scores of 68-67 were five better than anyone else in the field. He opened with a 75. Four players tied for third: Michael Bradham, Charles Collings and first-round leader Osborn Theam, all of Jacksonville, and teenager Aaron Jarvis of the Cayman Islands.

Women's Amateur: Sawgrass

High school student Kaitlyn Schroeder won by five shots with a one-over 145 after a final 72. Tied for second were Florida Gulf Coast College players Sarah Edwards and Alica Clark. Former champion Ramya Meenakshisundaram of the University of South Florida was fourth. Kim Keyer-Scott of Naples was the senior winner and the Super Senior went to Nancy Smith of Venice. The event was conducted by the First Coast Women's Amateur Committee.

East Tennessee State senior Trevor Hulbert birdied the 15th and 18th holes to force a playoff with College of Charleston senior Logan Sowell, then parred the

first hole of sudden death to win at the Hammock Beach Resort and Spa course.

Underwood Cup: Timuquana

The team of the best amateurs in Northeast Florida defeated the Northern Chapter PGA team in the 30th annual Underwood Cup. The amateurs now lead the Walker Cup-type series, 16-11-3.

Men's Senior Amateur: St. Johns Golf and Country Club

Larry Smith shot 33 on his final nine to pull away from Ken Moody and win by three shots. The St. Johns member closed with a 70 after opening with rounds of 69 and 72 for a three-day total of 3-under-par 213. Gary Blackwell of St. Johns successfully defended his Super Senior title and Frank Perry of Ponte Vedra shot 73-68—141 to claim his first age 70+ Grand Seniors title.

Match Play: Queen's Harbour

Mark Spencer canned birdie putts of 12 and 17 feet on the 17th and 18th holes to capture a 1 up victory over Marcus Reynolds of Watkinsville, Ga. In the third-place match, Scott Blackshear of Jacksonville prevailed over Gregg Carrier of Jacksonville Beach, 3&2.

Jax Beach topped 24 other teams from Northeast Florida with a 17-under-par team score of 127. The winning team had Northern Chapter PGA professional Thomas Gelsomino and amateur partners Brent Dietz, Keanu Evans and Michael Lupi. Tied for second were teams from Palencia, Westside Golf Center and Marsh Creek. Low pro honors went to Stephanie Connelly-Eiswerth of Eagle Harbor. The event was co-sponsored by JAGA and the Northern Chapter PGA.

Family Championship: Jax Beach

UNF golf coach Scott Schroeder and 16-year-old daughter Kaitlyn bettered their 2020 winning score by one and successfully defended their Family Division title. The Schroeders shot 61 and were declared champions after a match of cards with Chester and Chet Stokes. Rick and Kelly Root captured the Couples Division, posting a 62.

EARL & ELEANOR KELLY LONG-TERM SERVICE AWARD

Chester Stokes & Family, Marsh Landing CC

Chester Stokes, the long-time Jacksonville area real estate developer, has been influential on a broad scale since arriving in Jacksonville in 1965, not long after graduating from Georgia Tech. His projects include Marsh Landing, Marsh Creek, Summer Beach (now the Golf Club of Amelia,) Orange Park and Deercreek. Professional success has allowed the Blakely, Ga. native to support numerous philanthropic endeavors that have advanced needy causes throughout Northeast Florida. Marsh Landing CC has been at the forefront of the area golf scene every year since it opened in 1986. The Stokes family includes Chester's son and the club's general manager, Chet Stokes.

SUPERINTENDENT OF THE YEAR

Shannon Wheeler, Plantation

Since becoming Plantation's superintendent a year ago, Shannon Wheeler has significantly enhanced the golf course conditions and playability. The North Carolina State business and turf management graduate performed similar excellence in his previous role overseeing TPC Sawgrass/Dye's Valley just up the road from his new club.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD

Dr. Justine Redding & Richard Blackston, Moore-Myers Children's Fund

The Moore-Myers Children's Fund has demonstrated remarkable outreach to the golf community and an ability to meet their mission of allowing "children to flourish in an environment that allows them to be healthy, safe and successful." Co-founders Dr. Justine Redding (daughter of Annie M. Moore) and husband Richard Blackston (son of Jessie M. Myers) are non-stop in their support and promotion of the fund, which was launched in 2014 in partnership with The First Tee at Brentwood Golf Course.

Billy Walker, Cimarrone

After a lengthy career as an executive in the field of accounting, including a number of years with KPMG, Billy Walker has served in the capacity as JAGA treasurer since 2019. Melanie Bevill and husband Tommy Bevill have been longtime supporters of JAGA as tournaments hosts and other events and activities for many years. The same holds true for other organizations such as the North Florida Junior Golf Tour and the Northern Chapter PGA. Over the last year, as owners and operators, the Bevills have

invested in several important golf course renovations at Hyde Park, with many more enhancements in the works. Hyde Park, which will celebrate its 100th year in 2025, was a founding JAGA member in 1954. Bevill's father, the late Billy Maxwell, was co-owner of Hyde Park since the early 1970s.

As Tournament Chair for the Northern Chapter of the North Florida PGA the last two years, Mike Broderick has been a tireless promoter, communicator, and facilitator in organizing and running tournaments on behalf of the Chapter, particularly as it pertains to the Chapter's dealings with JAGA. The relationship between the Chapter and JAGA has never been stronger. Broderick became head golf professional at Deerwood earlier this year after a seven-year stint on the Sawgrass staff after a five-year tenure at Palencia.
